


WHONNOCK COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION BURSARY




JUNICHI TANAKA, born in Japan, established a ceramics studio at Whonnock in 1998.



TAPS held their annual meeting in January at a time when we could gather for meetings, food and fun in our home without any worries. Hopefully we will be able to gather once again in the near future.

The members have kept in touch with each other as concerns arise, but we have had a quiet quarter with wells maintaining consistent levels. We had a very rainy June and early July with sprinkles in between, so many of us have not had to haul water.

NEWS:

1. The new observation well installed in Selvey park by MFLNRO is now in operation collecting data. The well was drilled in March and data has been collected ever since. The live data collected by telemetry is yet to be installed. Hopefully by October. That will enable live data to be collected automatically and will be available for viewing by the public. The new well was installed because there was significant pumping interference by the nearby community well. Both wells will be monitored for a few years before the old well will be considered for decommissioning.
2. Parks, Recreation & Culture held two Open Houses on Sept. 9th and 22nd at the Whonnock Lake Centre. The City would like input from the community regarding the uses of the Thornhill Trails. Deadline for submission of the Online Comment Form have been extended to October 15th. We attended the Open House on September 22/20, where we had a productive, straightforward and informative meeting. They mentioned that the attendance was great (by pandemic standards) and they had already received over 650 responses, which is 10 times more than what they expect to receive from a survey.

Please read the information provided by the City and submit your thoughts on the Comment Form by October 15, 2020. Fill in the comment section #9.

For those who do not do Internet, printed copies of the Thornhill Trail Study Comment Form are available at the post office.

OUR EXPRESSED CONCERNS:

1. The maps are not an accurate reflection of all the trails that the mountain bikers have built.
2. The City provided no information on their maps nor information panels, that the current trails and future plans for proposed urban uses are on the Grant Hill Aquifer.
3. The City did not acknowledge that the Thornhill/Grant Hill Aquifer is the sole source of drinking water for hundreds of residents in our communities
4. They referenced the OCP regarding future development plans in the urban reserve. We need to remain vigilant, continue to protect our water source and educate our community that our water resource must be secure. The City agreed that bringing City water to Thornhill will be very expensive.
5. The Coquitlam and Seymour Watersheds are only accessible to the public through group tours and are physically protected from access while the Grant Hill Watershed is slated for development.
6. Developers, speculators and the City have long waited to develop our watershed because it is in unprotected City owned lands. Therefore, the residents are always at risk. We asked that these City owned lands become either a dedicated park or a conservation area.
7. The City is concerned by the increased impact from mountain biking activities and they are trying to determine the best way to manage it. It was left too long without any planning. They are aware that there are many users from outside of Maple Ridge.
8. Mountain biking is not compatible with horseback riding, walking, hiking and running. It is dangerous and poses a liability to the users and the City.
9. There is a growing problem related to parking on 256th. Dogs, pedestrians, cyclists, horses and cars do not mix as the roadway is no longer two lanes, with cars parked on both sides of the road.
10. We suggested that the City review their land bank to find a more suitable piece for mountain biking and then Thornhill Trails could once again be used for walking, hiking and horseback riding. Local users are reluctant to use the trails. The City is relying on the public to be the eyes and ears with regard to the activities on the Thornhill Trails. They said that although they will not expand the trails, they are reluctant to remove the current mountain biking activity.

We cannot emphasize enough that both the City and TAPS are asking all the residents to submit their completed Comment Form online or by dropping it off at the City by October 15th.

We hope you all keep healthy in the coming months and New Year. We will continue to protect and value our groundwater and mature forests. We are fortunate to live here and to have such beautiful natural resources we can protect.

GIANT PUMPKINS



The second annual Whonnock Giant Pumpkin growing contest is in full swing.

Last year over 100 people picked up their free pumpkin plants and attempted to grow the biggest pumpkin. Many obstacles were encountered along the way. Early on in the race slugs devoured some pumpkins and near the end there were reports of goat nib-

bling, chicken pecking and sheep eating entire pumpkins.

This year the participation has doubled with over 200 people picking up their free pumpkin seeds in early May. There is some heavy competition this year with those hoping to beat Joanne and Trevor Halliday's 109 pound pumpkin which won the day last year.

The rains in early summer made it hard for the bees to get inside the soggy pumpkin flowers, meaning pollination was not taking place. As a result, many pumpkins had a late start. When the sun came out again the pumpkins just took off with some people saying they were growing right before their eyes.


